SUBJECT: Unidentified Flying Objects

1. Reference is made to AFR 200-2, dated 12 August 1954, subject as above. On 26 May 1955, this office was advised by IRWIN J. SHAPIRO, A/B, AF-12468950, and EDWARD C. INGBER, A/B, AF-12468342, both of the 3457th STURON, F E Warren AFB, Wyoming, that they had observed unidentified flying objects at approximately 2400 hours, 22 May 1955, approximately five miles south of Cheyenne, Wyoming, while their car was parked on US Highway #85.

2. At approximately 1600 hours, 26 May 1955, both airmen were interviewed and the following information was obtained:

a. Description of objects.

- (1) Shape. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 - slender, rectangular, in vertical position. Objects Nos. 3 and 4 - oval, with protruding top.
- (2) Size. Objects appeared slightly larger than baseball.
- (3) Color. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 - white; Objects Nos. 3 and 4 - dark, with intermittent bluish-purple illumination.
- (4) Number. Four (4).
- (5) Formation. Side by side.
- (6) Features. Nos. 1 and 2 - slender, vertical, rectangular. Nos. 3 and 4 - oval, with protruding top.
- (7) Tail, trail of exhaust, including size. Negative.
- (8) Sound. Negative.

(9) Other pertinent or unusual features. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 appeared to be illuminated with a white light. Objects Nos. 3 and 4 appeared dark with only white side lights showing, but would intermittently light up a bluish-purple color. Size and shape of Objects Nos. 3 and 4 were determined during periods of illumination in bluish-purple light.

## b. Description of course of objects.

(1) What first called the attention of observers to the objects? Objects first observed while looking from car window.

(2) Angle of elevation and azimuth of objects when first observed. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 appeared to be approximately ten (10) feet above the horizon. Objects Nos. 3 and 4 appeared to be an undetermined height, a considerable distance above the horizon.

(3) Angle of elevation and azimuth of objects upon disappearance. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 appeared to ascend slightly and disappear from sight. Objects Nos. 3 and 4 began a southward ascending movement and went out of sight in approximately ten seconds.

(4) Manner of disappearance. Objects Nos. 3 and 4 disappeared from sight due to height and distance.

(5) Length of time in sight. Objects Nos. 1 observed approximately five to six seconds, then disappeared. Objects Nos. 1 and 2 then appeared for approximately ten seconds. Object No. 3 appeared and was observed for approximately five minutes. Object No. 4 appeared to move into sight along side No. 3, moving in a westerly direction.

(6) Manner of observation. Observation visual from ground level. No electronic equipment or optical equipment used.

## c. Time and date of sighting.

(1) Approximately 2345 hours, 22 May 1955 to 0030 hours, 23 May 1955.

(2) Light conditions. Night.

- d. Location of observers. Between the Junction of US Highway No. 85 and No. 87, in the southerly city limits of Cheyenne, Wyoming.
- e. Identifying information of all observers. A/B EDWARD C. INGBAR, AF-12468342 and IRWIN J. SHAPIRO, A/B, AF-12468950
- f. Weather and winds-aloft conditions at time and place of sightings.
  - (1) Observers account of weather conditions. Weather clear; visibility unlimited; no clouds.
  - (2) Report from nearest US Weather Bureau Office. Wind direction and velocity: Surface wind from 340° at 8 knots; at 6,000 ft from 300° at 16 knots; at 10,000 feet from 320° at 13 knots; at 16,000 feet from 290° at 20 knots; at 19,000 feet from 250° variable at 40 - 45 knots. No information is available concerning wind direction and velocity above 19,000 feet.
- g. Ceiling. At 1,000 from approximately 2000 hours to 2400 hours.
- h. Visibility. 15 miles.
- i. Amount of cloud cover. Approximately .5 (broken into scattered clouds at 1,000 feet, clearing at approximately 2328 hours).
- j. Thunderstorms in area and quadrant in which located. Negative.
- k. Any other unusual activity or condition, meteorological, astronomical, or otherwise, which might account for sighting. Arthur H. Hosick, Meteorologist, U.S. Weather Bureau, advised that during the period in question there were no unusual meteorological or astronomical conditions which might account for the sighting.
- l. Interception or identification action taken. Negative.
- m. Location of any air traffic in the area at time of sighting. Tom Powell, Control Tower, Cheyenne, Wyoming, advised that the only traffic which could have been in that area was Frontier Airlines, Flight 21, which departed from Cheyenne, Wyoming, for Denver, Colorado, at 2343 hours, 22 May 1955. Mr. Powell, operator of the Control Tower, identified the type of aircraft as a DC-3.
