 - a. Shape: Not discernable
 - b. Size: Head of a pin at arm's length
 - c. Color: Varied from off-yellow to white and then back to yellow
 - d. Number: One
 - e. Formation: Not applicable

 - i. Other pertinent or unusual features: Object consisted of a point of light of very constant intensity, but not much brighter than a star. Color of light as of c. above.
2. Description of course of object:
 - a. What first called the attention of observer to object? Object first noticed by children playing outside.
 - b. Angle of elevation and azimuth of the objects when first observed: Almost directly overhead, but slightly to the north.
 - c. Angle of elevation and azimuth of objects upon disappearance: Approximately 30° elevation, north-northwest of observer.
 - d. Description of flight path and maneuvers: When first observed, object was moving in a very tight circle of diameter approximately the size of a dime held at arm's length. After completing four 360° turns, object disappeared to proceed from northern side of circle to a north-northwest course. Estimated altitude 20,000 feet. Estimated speed on straight course 700 mph.
 - e. Manner of disappearance of object: View of object obscured when object passed below 30° elevation.
 - f. Length of time in sight: Approximately 1 minute when object was moving in circles; approximately 8 seconds when object moved from overhead to 30° elevation.
