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**DETAILS:**

1. This investigation predicated upon a directive (AFCSI Letter No. 85) dated 12 August 1949, to report all sightings of unidentified flying objects.

AT ALAMOGORDO, NEW MEXICO

2. The following information was obtained on a sighting of an unidentified object by the writer on 13 December 1949:

- a. Date of sighting: 13 December 1949.
  - b. Time of sighting: From 2008 to 2017 hours.
  - c. Where sighted: From ground, traveling in automobile, in a southwesterly direction from Alamogordo, New Mexico, to Holloman AFB, on US Highway No. 70.  
Position when first sighted: 32° 52' North  
105° 58' West.  
Position when object faded from view: 32° 51' North, 106° 2' West.
  - d. Number of objects: One
  - e. Observable celestial phenomena or planets that may account for the sighting: None
  - f. Distance of object from observer:
    - (1) Laterally or horizontally: Estimated maximum of 75 miles.
    - (2) Angle of elevation from horizon: 15°
    - (3) Altitude: Estimated maximum of 5000 ft above ground.
  - g. Time in sight: Approximately 9 minutes.
  - h. Appearance of object:
    - (1) Color: Object changed color from white to amber, to red, and to green; however not in the order as listed. During entire sighting a flame appeared to shoot out from various positions of object. When object disappeared from view, it faded out in a bright green color.
    - (2) Shape: Circular; e.g. Street light.
    - (3) Apparent construction: Undeterminable.
    - (4) Size: One and one-half times the size of the average street light at a distance of 8 miles.
  - i. Direction of flight: During first five (5) minutes, the object did not appear to be moving. Then it began to slowly move downward and to the right.
  - j. Tactics or maneuvers: The last estimated 3/4 second in view the object definitely suddenly picked up great speed while taking on this bright green color.
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- k. Evidence of exhaust: None
- l. Effect on clouds: No clouds
- m. Lights: The hour preceeding this sighting, while in the drive-in theater at Alamogordo, New Mexico, the writer and his sister-in-law, , and Mrs. , sighted several (approximately 6) brilliant shooting stars, some appeared to be a light green color and some appeared to travel much slower than others. Approximately 10 seconds before the Subject Object faded from view, another "shooting star" came from behind the automobile in which the writer and his companions were traveling, moving in the direction where the Object faded from view. This "shooting star" was of a slightly green color also, however, very bright, and traveled almost parallel to U.S. Highway 70, in a southwesterly direction. This "shooting star" appeared to fade from view before reaching the Subject Object.
- n. Support: None visible.
- o. Propulsion: Undeterminable.
- p. Control and stability: Very good.
- q. Air ducts: None visible.
- r. Speed: There was no definite movement the first five minutes in view. Object then began to move downward, which might have been forward movement away from the writer, giving the appearance of downward movement. However, this movement was very slow. The descent was at a rate of approximately 1° per minute. As mentioned before, object picked up speed within the last 3/4 of second in view. The writer cannot estimate speed at that time.
- s. Sound: No sound audible.
- t. Manner of disappearance: Object took on brilliant green color, picked up speed, and faded from view. Reason for disappearance in this case was definitely not due to the object traveling behind a mountain range, building, or any other obstacle.,

- (8) Former sightings: The writer has observed several "shooting stars" of a green color within the past year, and at this time was acutely conscious of obtaining correct information during the Subject sighting.

  - Mrs. ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ Alamogordo, New Mexico (wife of ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~).

3. Check of the Electronics and Atmosphere Branch, Holloman AFB, revealed that no information was obtained by them during the period the object was in view. Further check with the Base Weather Station, Holloman AFB, revealed that there were no unusual weather conditions at the time of the sighting nor had they any balloons or other free flying objects in the sky at that time. Check with the Operations & Projects Division, Holloman AFB, and the Research Section of White Sands Proving Ground, revealed that no testing devices had been sent aloft in this vicinity at the time of the sighting. Further inquiries of personnel of Holloman AFB revealed no other witnesses.



<b>SYNOPSIS</b> DETAILS:  This investigation is predicated on a letter from the Reverend [REDACTED], Farmington, New Mexico, dated 9 December 1949, in which [REDACTED] stated that at 1330 hours, 6 December 1949, he sighted an object at approximately 500 feet altitude and approximately 5 miles distant which appeared to be a charred parachute or cargo net dropping rapidly, such as a partially deflated parachute would. Due to shortage of Agent personnel, large work load, distance and expense of travel involved, indicated lead will not be developed by this office.
