DETAILS:

1. Investigation predicated upon verbal report of [REDACTED], Captain, AO-[REDACTED], 4675th Air Base Squadron, Hanscom AF Base, Bedford, Mass., who advised that on 24 July 1951 he had observed an unconventional aircraft in flight over the area of Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

AT BEDFORD, MASSACHUSETTS

2. On 14 August 1951, the writer interviewed Captain [REDACTED] Base Operations Officer, Hanscom AF Base. It was disclosed that on 24 July 1951, [REDACTED] was driving north on main U. S. Highway No. 1 towards the toll bridge at Portsmouth, New Hampshire. He was accompanied by Cpl [REDACTED], also of Hanscom AF Base. (At approximately 1910 hours, EST, he observed an object pass over the toll bridge leading into Portsmouth. The object was traveling from east to west at an estimated elevation of 1,000 to 2,000 feet, and at a speed of 800 to 1,000 mph. The description given by [REDACTED] is as follows:

A long tube with a fin construction on one end, 100 to 200 feet long, with a thickness of 1/5 the length. The object resembled fused glass, being grayish to invisible in color. The entire surface was covered with black polka dotted spots. There was no exhaust or vapor trail, excepting a swath resembling a very weak rainbow. There was no sound emanating from the object. The sighted object was in view for approximately 20 seconds, at which point it disappeared very quickly, as though it had gone into a cloud bank.

[REDACTED] advised that he is familiar with the contents of AFOIC-CC-1 Letter, dated 8 September 1950, dealing with the reporting of sighting of unconventional aircraft through military channels through Air Materiel Command. Steps have been taken to procure a teletyped sequence of weather conditions over Portsmouth, New Hampshire, at the time of the alleged sighting, and [REDACTED] will prepare the standard AF Form 112, in accordance with cited AFOIC Letter.

3. Cpl [REDACTED], AF-[REDACTED], 4675th Air Base Squadron, Hanscom AF Base, was interviewed with regard to his observations surrounding SUBJECT aircraft. Informant stated that he was with Capt [REDACTED] on the evening of 24 July 1951 and that he saw a long tubelike object such as the one described by Capt [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] further stated that he could supply no more information than the Captain and that he was relying on [REDACTED]'s judgment as to the height and speed of the object in question. Informant's knowledge and experience with military aircraft is negligible and there is nothing in his background that would lend credence to his ability to estimate height and speed of an exceptionally fast moving object.

4. In view of [REDACTED]'s statement declaring his intention to prepare a standard Form AF 112 regarding this matter, the case is considered CLOSED in the files of this office.



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REPORT OF SIGHTING OF UNCONVENTIONAL AIRCRAFT

1. Description: Long tube with fin construction on rear end of tube. 100-200 ft. long and thickness 1/5 of length with black spots dotted entire length. Overall color, almost colorless resembling fused glass, greyish to invisible almost transparent. It left no exhaust trail or vapor trail, except a swarth resembling a very weak rainbow. This rainbow was between our position and the sun making a reflection impossible. Estimated speed was very roughly 800-1000 MPH. No sound involved. No maneuvers, it was in level flight, travelling from east to west. It disappeared as quickly as it came into sight. It was clear out and no clouds visible in sky.

2. Time: 1910H, duration of observation was approximately twenty seconds. 24 July 1951

3. Manner of Observation: Visual observation from an automobile going in a northerly direction on a main U. S. highway.

4. Location of Observer: Proceeding north along main highway towards bridge at Portsmouth, N. H., about two miles from toll gate at bridge. The object passed over the bridge from east to west at approximately 1000-2000 ft. The object could have been 2-4 miles away from observers position.

5. Observer: Cpl. [REDACTED], AF [REDACTED], and, Capt. [REDACTED]

6. Weather: Weather sequence attached.

7. No meteorological conditions present.

8. No photos or physical evidence available.

9. Two F-47's flying in southerly direction at 1900H about 10-15 miles from object. Miscellaneous small aircraft flying in same area with F-47's.

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STATEMENT OF OBSERVER OF UNCONVENTIONAL AIRCRAFT

On Tuesday, 24 Jul 51, while travelling north on U.S. Route 1, near Portsmouth, New Hampshire, in the company of Captain [REDACTED], USAF, I saw an unusual object in the sky. This object was travelling in from the sea in a westerly direction and I would estimate its altitude at between 500 and 1000 feet.

Although I could make no estimate regarding the speed of the object, I can say that it was travelling at a considerably greater rate of speed than any other type of aircraft that I have ever seen. Although the object was not well defined, its shape resembled that of a large hot-dog, tapering slightly toward the rear and perhaps four or five times as long as it was high.

The object was in my sight for between five and ten seconds and then seemed to disappear from sight, as if into a cloud bank, although there were no clouds in that area at that time.

The time of the sighting was 1910 EST.
