1. Reference is made to your Report 4706DW-2-52 dated 29 May 52 and basic letter, Intel 000.9 dated 31 May 1952. Analysis of the object shows it to be a large glass marble covered with a tar-like substance. It is impossible to determine its origin, although it is probably man-made. About the only conclusions which can be made are that the object had not traveled at any great speed for any distance (which would have melted and removed the coating) and that a high velocity on impact would either have shattered the glass or driven it through the mail box rather than merely denting it. It is deemed quite probable that the marble was thrown or slung. Because of the foregoing no further investigation of this matter is believed necessary.

It would be possible to determine the energy necessary to dent the mailbox, as mentioned in the original report, therefore, obtaining an estimate of how far the marble fell or if it were shot from a "slingshot", etc. However, it is not deemed advisable to do this due to time and financial factors.

The following report is submitted in compliance with ADCL 200-1, dtd 11 Apr 51, as amended by ADC MISSION INTELLIGENCE, Issue No. 3, dtd 16 Apr 52.

1. One (1) spherical, transparent, glass-like object, measuring approximately one inch in diameter, covered with a thin layer of tar- or macadam-like substance, was recovered.
2. Object struck steel mailbox at residence of Mr. ██████████ LOMBARD, ILLINOIS, at approximately 0830 hours CDST 21 May 1952. Rounded corner of steel mailbox was dented approximately three-sixteenths (3/16) of an inch by the impact, where a minute amount of object's outer covering was deposited before object ricocheted to porch, leaving a black mark in the last two and one-half (2-1/2) feet of its roll.
3. Four minutes after the noisy impact, Mr. ██████████ located the object, and picked it up, but dropped it as it was too hot to hold. It did not burn his hand. None of the tar-like covering stuck to his fingers. The object dropped on the wet lawn, where it steamed, forming a small steam-like cloud in the still air until the object cooled. Twenty minutes later Mr. ██████████ picked up the object (now cooled) and took it to the Lombard Police Station.
4. Partially closed porch and roof overhang indicate object came from south-southeast (SSE) at approximately a forty-five (45) degree angle.
5. Object has not been analyzed nor tested for radio activity.
6. Nearest factory is an electromotive plant approximately twelve (12) miles southeast of LOMBARD.
7. Six F-86 type aircraft were airborne from O'HARE INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, ten (10) miles northeast of LOMBARD, at the time of the incident. Of these six, two were on their first flight since their display to the public on Armed Forces Day. However, a check of these two aircraft reveals no traces of tar in the aft sections. Aircraft were examined to determine the possibility of object having been deposited in aft section. There was negative evidence to indicate object had ever been so contained.
8. Weather: 12,000 broken, 25,000 broken; 2-1/2 miles visibility in smoke; temperature, 50°; dew point, 45; wind, calm; altimeter setting, 29.97.

One (1) spherical transparent glass-like object, 1-1/2 inch in diameter, partially covered with black and reddish material resembling tar or macadam, struck mailbox at the residence of [REDACTED] in LOMBARD, ILLINOIS, approximately 0830 hours CDST 21 May 1952. It dented rounded corner of steel mailbox 3/16 inch, and bounced to porch, leaving black line to point where owner of house picked it up four minutes later, but dropped it due to its heat. Position of mailbox on partially closed porch indicates object came from south-southeast at 45° angle to horizontal.
