<p>Observer and his wife were standing on the corner of 21st street and High Avenue, on the South outskirts, city of Topeka, Kansas. Both observed the object directly South of their position, on angle of <math>15^{\circ}</math> above the horizon, approximately 10 miles distant.</p>			
<p>The object was a brilliant red pulsating light. The shape varied from circular to oval in the vertical dimension as it pulsated. Observer could not estimate size.</p>			
<p>The object did not move, made no sound, and left no trail. It was observed for 5 minutes as timed by observer's watch, and disappeared instantly without moving from position and without leaving a trace.</p>

DETAILS:

1. On 1 July 1962, 2nd Lt. CHARLES P. KELLY, AF 2221938, 380th  
Combatment Squadron, Forbes AFB, Kansas, furnished Special Agent  
Alfred P. Savage the following information concerning subject inci-  
dents.

a. At 1850 hours, 27 June 1962, KELLY and his wife were  
taking a walk near their home in Topeka, Kansas. When they reached  
the corner of 21st and High Streets, their attention was drawn to a  
bright red light, hovering in the air directly above their locations.

b. KELLY estimated that the object was approximately ten (10)  
miles away and at an angle of fifteen (15) degrees elevation above the  
horizon. He believes the size to be about two-hundred (200) ft in diameter.

c. The object was observed for five (5) minutes, and, during  
this time, it changed shape from elongated to oval in a pulsating manner  
at an estimated rate of thirty (30) pulses per minute. It exhibited no  
movement other than the pulsating action and disappeared instantly "much  
like turning off an electric light." There was no smoke or vapor of any  
kind.

2. There were no known celestial phenomena which would account  
for the sighting, and weather conditions were clear, with visibility  
of fifteen (15) miles.

3. Lt. KELLY is 22 years of age and has between 500 and 600  
hours of flying time as a pilot.





At 0845 hours, 27 June 1952, an unidentified object was observed at an undetermined distance west of Orlando, Florida. Observation was made by [redacted] Orlando, Florida, who was in front of his house, facing west, at the time of sighting.

The object was in sight approximately 30 seconds. When first sighted it was approximately 45° above the horizon, climbing at an angle of approximately 30°. Upon reaching an altitude of estimated 1500 feet the object descended at an angle of approximately 30° and was lost from sight approximately 45° above the horizon. The object was moving at an estimated 500 to 600 miles per hour.

Object, which was viewed only from the side, appeared to be cross section of a disc with diameter approximately equal to the length of T-33 type aircraft, the thickness being 1/10 to 1/8 of diameter. The object was silver in color, with a reflection from the upper surface. There were no protuberances or exhaust visible. Object was accompanied by a sound similar to a jet exhaust, but of a higher pitch, and with a secondary sound which resembled that of bacon frying.

The observer served two years in the Navy as Radio Operator.

Weather at time of sighting was CAVU with scattered cumulus clouds.

No interceptions were made, and no photographs were taken.

T-33 type aircraft from this base were flying in the vicinity of Orlando during period of observation at altitudes from 1500 to 30000 feet.
