SYNOPSIS:

Two (2) employees of Technicraft Laboratories, Incorporated, Thomaston, Connecticut, reported that they observed a bright, silver, cigar-shaped object which appeared to have a black gondola attached on the underside. No activity or condition exists that accounts for the sighting.

DETAILS:

1. On 29 July 1952, Captain JOSEPH EIGNER, Wing Intelligence Officer, 1600th Air Transport Wing, Westover Air Force Base, Massachusetts, telephonically advised Headquarters, 1st District OSI that a Miss [REDACTED] of Union City, Connecticut, and Miss [REDACTED] of Waterbury, Connecticut, employees at Technicraft Laboratories, Incorporated, Thomaston, Connecticut, had sighted an unidentified airborne object on 25 July 1952.

2. On 30 July 1952, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were interviewed by Special Agent CLIFFORD E. ELLIOTT and furnished the following information:

a. The object appeared similar to a cigar in shape and appeared to be exceptionally high. Witnesses were unable to give any estimate as to its altitude. Both believed it to be a rather large object, bright silver in color, but with no glow or sheen to it. [REDACTED] advised that

the lower edge toward the front appeared very black. [REDACTED] stated it appeared to her to have a gondola, similar to a blimp in that respect, and this was very black. Only one such object was sighted and both advised that it tapered off to a cigar shape effect and that it did not have any propeller or tail. No trail or exhaust was observed, and object was motionless when first sighted. When object started to move, it tilted downward at a shallow angle. Witnesses' view was obscured for four or five seconds by trees. Upon being in the clear again, they stopped their vehicle, got out and scanned the skies, but were unable to see it. [REDACTED] advised that when object first started to move it appeared to her to be going at the approximate speed of a regular passenger plane. Both witnesses advised that although they listened, they were unable to hear any sound.

De. [REDACTED] advised that she saw [REDACTED] through the right windshield of the automobile at about 10:00 hours and [REDACTED] advised that for approximately 3 minutes she studied it, trying to determine what it could be. [REDACTED] when asked [REDACTED] if she saw no object and [REDACTED] replied affirmatively. [REDACTED] stated she saw the object for approximately five minutes while [REDACTED] had observed it for about five minutes.

On 10/10/61, member of club [REDACTED] was driving in an automobile at a speed of approximately 20 to 25 MPH. [REDACTED] was a [REDACTED] class driver, which she advised, corrected her vision to 20/20. [REDACTED] does not wear glasses and advised that she has excellent eyesight.

He intimated that they were near the Salvage Recovery Service, Incorporated, on the Thompson-Luterbury Road when object was first sighted. [REDACTED] advised that the car the subject drove on three inches from the top of the right windshield. Both stated the angle of sight was less than 45°, and were unable to estimate the altitude, other than that it appeared exceptionally high.

1. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] advised that at the time of sightings the weather was extremely clear, with no clouds or wind. Both stated the visibility was perfect.

g. Records, United States Weather Bureau, Brainerd Field, Hartford, Connecticut, were checked with the assistance of [REDACTED], Meteorologist. Records reflect that at the time of sighting, weather was as follows: Clear skies, visibility, 15 plus miles, temperature 67°, dewpoint 56°, wind, surface NNE 7 miles per hour. NARAK advised that this weather extended throughout the major part of the state of Connecticut.

h. There were no activities or conditions, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.

i. There exists no physical evidence and no interception or identification action was taken.

Two disc shaped objects reflecting silver light were observed moving together on a North-South course over the center of Wilmington, Delaware. During movement, the flat portion of the discs remained parallel to the earth. The objects briefly disappeared from view around the corner of a building, then only one of the objects reappeared, turning Southeastward and shooting straight up and out of sight. No trails were observed, nor were accompanying sounds detected. Time of sighting: 1515Z, 25 July 52; the objects were observed for approximately five seconds. The observer stood at a third floor window in the Dravo Building, at the foot of Market Street in downtown Wilmington, and with his naked eye saw the objects appear on a crossing course, passing almost directly overhead.

Observer: ██████████, Wilmington, Delaware, is a civilian employee of the Veterans Administration, who served in World War II in the Army Transportation Corps.

Weather: Visibility unlimited; winds aloft were from 7 to 10 knots varying from Northeast to the Northwest. There was no local meteorological activity to account for the sighting. There is no physical evidence such as fragments or photos. No interception action was taken.



Object was sighted by civilian observer employed by the Sheriff's Office, Norwalk, California. The object was round, very bright, and motionless until 1905PST when it tilted or turned to one side and the color changed to dull orange. As the object tilted apparent propulsion was noted. A puff of smoke 5 or 6 times as large as the object appeared and it shot ahead at a high rate of speed. A westerly climb was continued for about 40 seconds whereupon the object disappeared at a very high altitude.

1. An unidentified flying object was visually observed from the ground at the intersection of Stanbridge and Parkcrest in Norwalk, California 25 July 1952. Object was sighted at 1855PST by two Sheriff's Office employees.

2. Object was first believed to be a star. The object was round, very bright and motionless until 1905PST when it tilted or turned to one side and changed to a dull orange color. As the object turned or tilted, propulsion was applied and a puff of smoke 5 or 6 times as large as the object appeared and the object shot ahead at a high rate of speed. It then climbed westerly for about 40 seconds after which it disappeared at a very high altitude.

3. Weather was clear, visibility 12 miles, winds aloft from 20,000 feet to 60,000 feet were southwesterly varying from 10 to 28 knots.

4. Witness: Mr. [REDACTED], an employee of the Sheriff's Office, Norwalk, California, and his partner, name unknown.

5. Air traffic in the area at time of sighting was two B-29's; AF 8765 and AF 5440. These two aircraft were at 17,000 feet, mission unknown.

6. Report was called to Los Angeles Control by the observer and was passed by that agency to March Flight Service Center via Plan 62 Interphone at approximately 2130 PST 25 July 1952.

Comments of Preparing Officer:

1. Insufficient background information on the primary witnesses is available to determine aerial observer qualifications. Witnesses were not interrogated.

Object was sighted by civilian observer of Lennox, California at 1810PST 25 July 1952. Object was first believed to be a star and remained motionless for 15 to 20 minutes, after which it started moving North and then started an arc to the west, picking up speed until it was directly overhead. It then broke into 5 parts or was originally 5 objects so close together they appeared to be one. The object or objects were very high and after they separated one followed or trailed the other four and was thought to have left a vapor trail as it climbed out of sight. Flight was very erratic and the object(s) remained visible for 45 minutes.

1. An unidentified flying object(s) was (were) observed from the ground from [REDACTED], Lennox, California, on 25 July 1952. First sighting occurred at 1810PST and objects were visible for a period of 45 minutes.

2. Object was reported as resembling a star. No motion was observed for the first 15 to 20 minutes of sighting, after which the object began a northward movement followed by an arcing movement to the West gaining speed until directly overhead. It then broke into 5 parts or was 5 objects so close together they appeared to be one. Altitude was given as very high and, after separating, one followed or trailed the other 4 and was thought to have left a vapor trail. Flight was reported as very erratic.

3. Weather at time of sighting was reported as clear with 12 miles visibility, winds aloft at 20,000 feet from 130° at 10 knots, 30,000 feet from 130° at 28 knots, 40,000 feet from 160° at 25 knots, 50,000 feet from 140° at 23 knots, 60,000 feet from 120° at 13 knots.

4. Witness: Mr. [REDACTED] civilian of [REDACTED] Lennox, California (Telephone [REDACTED]).

5. Air traffic in the area at time of sighting consisted of two B-29's, AF 8765 and AF 5440. No information as to the mission being performed by these aircraft is available.

6. Report was called to Los Angeles Control by the observer and was passed by that agency to March Flight Service Center via Plan 62 interphone at approximately 2200PST 25 July 1952.

1. No information as to the occupation of the single observer is available. Observer was not contacted.

At 1043 Daylight Time, 25 July 1952, the following information was received by this station (P-49) from the GOC Filter Center at Syracuse, New York:

GOC Post QN 438 at New Berlin, New York, reported an unidentified flying object was spotted at a point 20 miles NW of QN 4137 at 2210 DT, 25 July 1952. The object was continuously observed for a period of 30 minutes. It was cylindrical in shape, yellowish white, very high and moved slowly. Object changed direction every five (5) seconds moving in an oval pattern.

The weather was clear, good visibility, with high scattered clouds.

After 2237DT sightings were intermittent; object seemed to be loosing altitude and appeared to be ball shaped rather than cylindrical. It then faded in the distance to the North.

The authenticity of this report is unknown as information was very brief and given by only one source.

This object was not picked up on the radar at this site at any time.
