Two unidentified objects were observed visually at 2031 Pacific Daylight Time (3 August 1952) for a period of 22 minutes. The objects were described as the size of a star, blue white in color changing to red. The objects were headed in a northerly direction at a slow speed. They appeared to be moving up and down in trail formation at approximately 10,000 feet altitude.

The observer a Mr. [REDACTED] was located at a GOC Post in the Hall of Justice Building, 27th Street, Richmond, California.

The observer reports the weather as clear in the area with fog to the east and north. The objects went into the fog and were lost from view at 2053 Pacific Daylight Time, 3 August 1952.

Meteorological activity, physical evidence of the sighting and identification action taken were reported as negative.

The duty controller reports heavy traffic of aircraft in the area at the time of the sightings.

Comments of Preparing Officer:









Dear Sir:

The object I reported, to be frank, excited me and also the other observers who saw it. However we have been seeing this same object every evening for over two weeks! There are about 15 observers who have seen it besides myself since then. It always appears in the western sky about five minutes after the sun sets and we have watched it for as much as twenty minutes, sometimes less. We have noticed it has appeared much more to the south lately, but at the same altitude and it always goes down behind the hills. It appears blue-white at higher altitude and then changes to orange and as it gets near the horizon ^{and} seems to become much larger.

After watching it for this length of time I feel it is most likely a star. Watching it through binoculars it seems perfectly round, but

a time seems to flatten out. Just for record this object does appear about 15 minutes before the first star!

I am an amateur photographer and a few nights after I first spotted it I took my camera up on the post and attempted to get a time exposure of it. However I must admit that nothing seems to show up on the negatives. At any rate I'm enclosing two of them with this letter. Maybe your photographers, through enlargements, may find it will appear.

In closing may I add that I was an observer during the last year with 500 hours to my credit, also I helped get out post here going in 1950 and am now serving two and three shifts a week; but in all this time of observing I have never seen anything like this before, except that one evening in 1950. as I have said before, it may be, and probably is, a star or planet but it is the first time I've ever seen one so bright and clear and large.

I do know it is not my imagination because so many other observers have seen it since I first saw it. They all have agreed on what we have seen also.

I sincerely hope this will help to clear up at least one of the hundreds of reports you must receive.
