1. This office has received two (2) Summary of Information Reports from the Baltimore Regional Office, 109th CIC Detachment, Subject: Sighting of an Unusual Luminous Aerial Object, dated 12 March and 25 March 1953. These Summary of Information Reports are set forth verbatim as follows:

"Between 0739 and 0741 hours, 26 February 1953, [REDACTED] Captain, [REDACTED], Medical Service Corps, Chief of Radiological Hygiene Division, Army Environmental Health Laboratory, Army Chemical Center, Maryland, who was driving alone in his automobile in a westerly direction on U.S. Route 1, two to three miles west of Kingsville, Maryland, sighted an unusual luminous aerial object in the northeast sky. The object appeared to be self illuminated and about forty degrees above the horizon. [REDACTED] estimated the surface brightness and color temperature to be about the same as that of the sun which at that time was partly obscured by clouds in the southeast sky. A layer of medium dark gray stratus clouds, at an estimated altitude of 7,000 to 10,000 feet, were in the same part of the sky, but [REDACTED] was unable to determine whether the object was between him and the clouds, the midst of the clouds, or the far side of the clouds.

"At first sight the object appeared to be a motionless, sharply-defined ellipse with a vertical major axis. The minor axis appeared contained herein has been derived from sources other than USAF. to be about two-thirds as long as the major axis. ██████████ estimated that at two and one-half feet from his eye the projected diameter of the object would be about one-eighth of an inch.

"After about fifteen seconds the brightness diminished somewhat and for an estimated five seconds the aerial object assumed the mushroom-shaped appearance of the caustic produced by the reflections of sunlight on the smooth interior of a wedding ring. Motion of the object first became apparent during this five-second period.

"Thereafter the major axis appeared to be horizontal and the object resumed its original brightness. It appeared to move at the same altitude in an easterly direction until, due to its movement away from the observer, it had reached a position thirty degrees above the horizon. Plott then lost sight of the object due to the progress of his automobile behind a hill. Upon reaching an unobstructed area further down the road, the object had disappeared and was not seen again. No smoke or vapor trails were observed.

"Captain ██████████ qualifications as an observer are as follows: 20/20 vision corrected by eyeglasses. He has a bachelor of science degree from Carnegie Institute of Technology where he majored in physics. Among his studies at Carnegie Tech was a one year course on the phenomena of light. ██████████ has used light phenomena as a physicist in connection with experimental work off and on for a period of eight years. On numerous occasions ██████████ has observed reflections from aircraft and pyrotechnic flares of various kinds and observed no similarity in color, brilliance and shape between the luminous aerial object and anything he had observed before.

"At 1600 hours, 26 February 1953, an agent of this office returned with ██████████ to a spot one hundred yards west of the intersection of Forge Road and U. S. Route 1 where ██████████ first observed the object. A compass was sighted on the spot in the sky where ██████████ first observed the object and a reading of thirty degrees was obtained. A check at the Churchville Ordnance Corps tank proving ground - the only known activity in that direction that could have been using pyrotechnics - revealed that no pyrotechnics had been used in that area.

"AGENT'S NOTE: The 208th AAA Battery, Catonsville, Maryland, was checked regarding any activity in the area with negative results.

I. Description of Incident

An Air Force major and enlisted personnel from this base observed a green object with a trail of sparks traveling downward at a high rate of speed and disappearing behind mountains to the east. The size of the object was compared to that of the moon. Time of sighting was 1910 local time and the existing weather conditions were generally good.

II. Discussion of Incident

Project Blue Book's contract astronomer is of the opinion that the object seen was an exceptionally bright meteor. The size of the object has probably been overestimated. Two factors substantiate the meteor conclusion in this case: 1) the fact that it followed a downward course and 2) that it gave off sparks, two characteristics of a common meteor. No length of observation was given but it probably was a matter of seconds.

III. Conclusion

Probably a meteor.
