Gentlemen:

I would like to report an unusual aerial sighting. Saturday evening, April 28th, at approximately 8:30 p.m., my wife and I were sitting on our front porch steps in semi-darkness when we were attracted by what appeared to be a bright star getting brighter. For more than ten seconds its light increased to a white brilliance, then it began to dim to a medium dull red.

This observance was casual until the light started to move from east to west. A transport aircraft bound for New York was passing in the same line of sight at a few thousand feet altitude and was noted to be moving at a little more than double the speed of the light. The brightness of the light diminished after about 30 seconds of travel and it became dull red. Then its movement accelerated to what must have been enormous speed, considering the estimated high altitude. Then its light became faint as it wobbled and disappeared. The elapsed time from first noting the growing brightness of the light did not amount to more than three minutes.

Lacking any equipment to record this phenomenon, I immediately drew a map of the sky as it was at the time of the occurrence. The enclosed map also details the movement of the light and other estimates which may help locate the area of the odd sighting.

As to credibility, I can offer the fact that aviation was my business throughout the late war. I was a technical representative for Lockheed Overseas Corp. and Curtiss-Wright Corp. in England and Europe. Also, I was a scientific consultant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Technical Industrial Intelligence Committee, that evaluated German aviation development after the end of the European war in 1945. I have a Certificate of Appreciation from the Army for this.


Speaking from this background, I can assure you that the aerial object was not an aircraft of any revealed type and it was not a meteor nor a comet. I have always been skeptical about these things until now and decided to write only after I talked with a radar man.

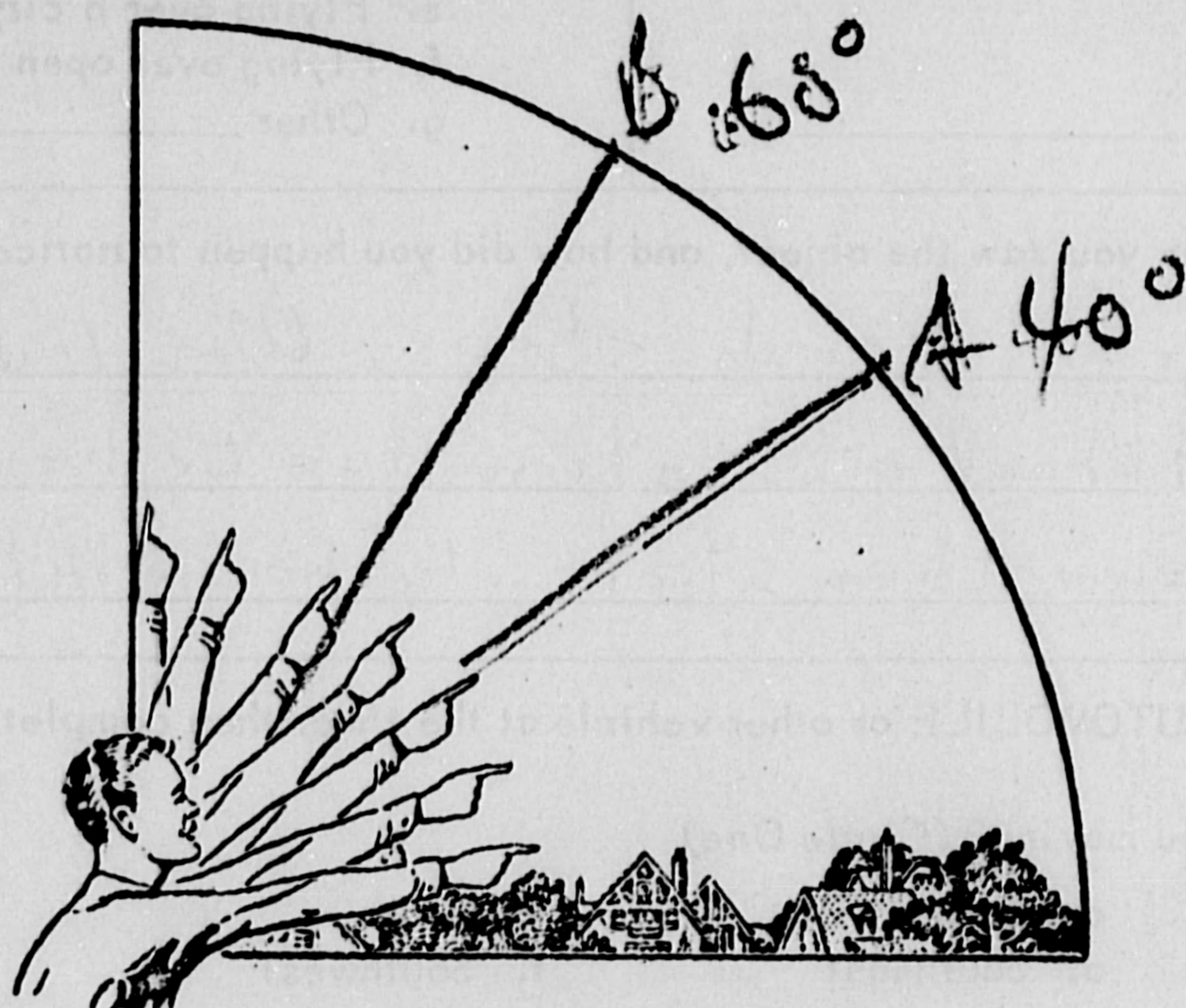

My wife & I were sitting on our front porch steps on a hot, clear, moonless night when our attention was attracted by what appeared to be a bright star getting brighter. It was motionless, in the Northeast. After maybe 30 seconds it started to dim and then began to move to the Northwest. It turned red and then dull red, traveling slower than an airplane passing. Then, it accelerated to a tremendous speed and vanished. It was mainly the speed that convinced me that the light was not conventional.

I later talked to a radar man who said I should report it because Fort Monmouth has radar scanning the area involved. Also, he stated that there are many unexplained radar pick-ups and it is helpful to have them confirmed visually.

If this sighting was of a UFO it should be confirmed by the records of the radar station at Monmouth or perhaps Newark airport. The light, or object, was in sight long enough to be spotted. My farm is on a heavily travelled air lane where airliners are climbing and descending, so they are probably under radar scrutiny.

I am glad these things are being studied because if they are real and passers the apparent powers we don't have, they could be a genuine menace or a source of great knowledge.

I am unsatisfied with the Air Force releases that indicate I saw a conventional performance and didn't realize it.
