Dear Sir:

The following experience and observation
is one which I believe should be reported to
the proper authorities. On the evening of ^{July} 10, 1959 between 8:30 and 9:00, while driving,
a friend and I noticed in the sky, consider-
ably above the horizon, a streak of brilliant
light (like lightning, but constant), about
three feet long; it appeared to be about one inch
thick. There was a space of about one foot
and then there was a second one. The two
appeared to be moving rapidly. My friend said,
there was a brighter light at the front ^{end}.
He watched as closely as we could for about
two minutes but before we could pack the car
they gradually grew faint and out of sight. They
were moving west (at least we saw them in
the western sky). Potsdam is in northern N.Y. state

about twenty miles from Massena (St. Lawrence Power Development and Seaway).

I expected perhaps others had seen the phenomenon but saw nothing in the papers until this morning. I am enclosing the clipping. It is a very similar description of what we saw.

The reason for reporting it is that the same observation was made by us in northeastern U.S. as was seen by these pilots in western U.S. I hope my description sounds coherent; it is a little difficult to describe something not seen before.

SAUCERS ARE FLYING THE PACIFIC

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Pilots of three Pan American passenger planes reported sighting unidentified flying objects early today as they headed for Honolulu. Capt. George Wilson radioed that objects with "extremely bright light, surrounded by smaller lights" and traveling very fast, appeared to be bearing down on the plane at an altitude of 21,000 feet. Suddenly they veered to the south and disappeared, after about 10 seconds, he said.

Wilson gave his location as about 840 miles from Honolulu, en route from San Francisco, and the time as 6:02 a.m. Pacific daylight.

Capt. Noble Sprunger, flying from Los Angeles to Honolulu, and Capt. E. G. Kelley, whose flight left San Francisco for Hawaii about half an hour ahead of the Wilson plane, also radioed they had seen the objects around 6 a.m.

The reports were turned over to military authorities.
