



1. A positive identification of the objects which appear in these three photo prints is not possible with the limited information furnished.

2. It is suggested that the negatives of these photographs be obtained from the sources if possible, and also that more details concerning the conditions under which the pictures were taken be given. Were pictures taken through a window glass? Inside a building? Were the inside lights on? Were they taken from an automobile?

3. The two photographs dated 26 Sep 60 show three images which cannot be explained from photo analysis. It is stated in the letter dated 29 Sep 60 that the diameter of these objects is about 15 meters and focused on infinity. The objects are out of focus which could mean either that they are very small and close to the camera or moving very rapidly. It is possible that either the negative or original print could be retouched since the intensity of the dark objects is much greater than the other dark areas on these prints.


