

sighting "flap" in Maine last February 7th and 8th included several fairly detailed descriptions. One of the best reports came from a man who was driving on the Maine Turnpike at 2:40 a.m. on February 9th. He became aware of a "terrible brilliance" which lit up the whole upper left hand corner of the windshield. As he watched in amazement, a spherical-shaped object - brilliant pea green and somewhat bluish - moved across the sky from northwest to northeast. He said it was ten times brighter than a shooting star and was trailed by a cone-shaped tail of sparks. There was a brilliant flash of light almost like an explosion as the object disappeared below the horizon.
