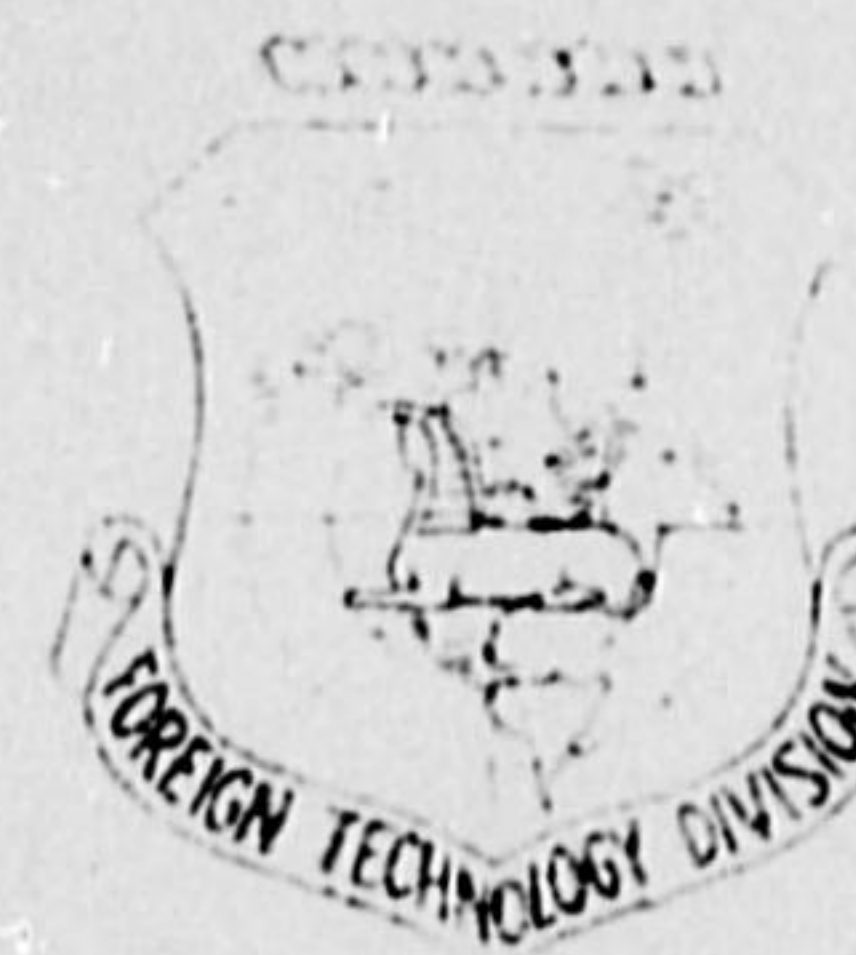

The following information is provided to assist your office in a reply to Mr. [REDACTED] regarding the object he observed on 15 March 1964.

a. The Pleiades are in the West at about 40 degs elevation and Orion in the Southwest (az 220 deg) at 55 degs elevation. The motion of the object was to the Southeast.

b. Consultation with Dr Robinson (FTD Astronomer) indicates that a moving object of +6 magnitude is not visible to the naked eye. Therefore, it is assumed that the object was brighter.

c. Characteristics of his observation are similar to those sightings previously confirmed as satellites. The arc-distance traveled and the fact that the object passed in five minutes are considered with our analysis.

d. As a satellite passes into the earth's shadow, it is no longer visible, which would account for the sudden disappearance of the object. Irregular motion in flight, if not extreme, can be attributed to atmospheric conditions. We do not carry data on the flight path of these objects, other than Echo I and Echo II. Both of these satellites are usually of the first or second magnitude. Therefore, Mr Carter's sighting is probably one of the smaller satellites visible to the naked eye, such as 1962 B THETA.

After reading this letter you feel
I have wasted your time please accept my
apologies. I am sometimes years old and
am in the process of writing my senior
thesis on the theory of "flying saucers" which
is part of the reason I happened to be observing
this skies on Sunday Night, March 15, 1964
at 10:00 clock. I went outside to get a
paper for my father and happened to look up
and was thinking deeply about my thesis, when
I thought I saw something moving in the
northwest portion of the sky and thought
for a moment I was letting my imagination
run away from me, and then I was certain
it was moving. It moved at a very low rate
of speed south.

any details of the object were not capable of being made out.

I am an "amateur" astronomer and am certain this was something I have never seen before. The object had a possible +6 magnitude; it seemed to look like a star moving in a wobbly pattern across the sky.

Elevation and distance was unable to be determined.

My mother and sister felt that the object was an airplane and I felt the same at first, but when the object reached the middle of the horizon, 51°, the light suddenly went out; My mother told me that sometimes planes will turn out their lights, but this object had only one soft white light and moved to show for a plane in the following pattern.

south at 15 miles per hour.

My mother and sister forgot the incident
with the theory that the object was an
airplane that "doused" its lights. This all

all news or theories. This is just an ordinary
report that you probably receive daily, with
no distinct description as others give, but this
being my first sighting, I'm a bit interested

The arc-distance traveled and the fact that the object passed in five minutes are considered in this analysis.

As a satellite passes into the earth's shadow, it is no longer visible, which would account for the sudden disappearance of the object. Irregular motion in flight, if not extreme, can be attributed to atmospheric conditions. The Air Force does not carry data on the flight path of these objects, other than Echo I and Echo II.
