

At approximately 0325 hours, 6 Sep 64, source telephonically reported to Security and Law Enforcement Division, Robins AFB Ga, that while visiting the residence of Mr. [REDACTED], Macon Ga, at about 0245 hours (Eastern Standard Time), 6 Sep 64, he observed an object that was reddish orange in color, glowing, egg shaped, with beam of light in front at about 55 degrees above the horizon between the "Little Dipper," and "Morning Star". This described object was observed for only a few seconds and traveled about twelve inches from North to Southeast and disappeared. Seconds later, two objects that looked like stars were observed in the same location as the first object. These two objects moved up and down and side to side like the letter "W". These objects were observed for about two hours and faded out in place at daybreak. AlC Lewis M. Swartzbaugh, AF13665118, Air Policeman, was dispatched to 1107 James St, Macon Ga, where the following information was obtained:

Mr. DeGroot opined that it is not likely any of the balloons released from the three locations described would have drifted to Macon Ga, area, since winds would not have carried them in this direction.

Aircrafts in the area during time of sightings: Mr. Fahr, Base Operations (WRBFD), Robins AFB Ga, reported that at 0806Z hours, 6 Sep 64, a Capital Airline Argosy Aircraft departed in a Northwest direction from Runway Nr. 32, Robins AFB Ga, enroute to Mobile Ala. There was no other aircraft reported in or around the Macon Ga area.

4. Any other activity or condition which might account for the sightings: Mr. James E. Macon, Civilian Policeman, Security and Law Enforcement Division, Robins AFB Ga, reported that while on duty as a policeman at Post Nr. 13, near the west boundary of Robins AFB Ga, at about 0830Z hours (0330 hours Eastern Standard Time), 6 Sep 64, he observed what appeared to be a Shooting Star move from north to southeast for a distance of approximately 36 inches and then burn out in approximately the same area as where unidentified flying objects were allegedly observed.

5. No physical evidence was obtained during these sightings.

6. Position title and comments of the preparing officer, including his preliminary analysis of the possible cause of the sighting(s): Lt Lonnie Z. Wetherington, GS-8, Civilian Policeman, Acting Shift Captain, Security and Law Enforcement Division, Robins AFB Ga. Based on information reported by Policeman Mason, the first object sighted by witnesses may have been the shooting star which burned out in

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approximately the same location where this object was observed. After this initial sighting, the power of suggestion, excitement, fatigue, and imagination combined probably accounted for the two star-like objects observed.

7. Details concerning these sightings were telephonically furnished to WRAMA Command Post, Robins AFB, Ga., who further relayed this information to AFSC (FTD), Wright-Patterson AFB Ohio during morning of 6 Sep 64.

(1) Observer(s) account of weather conditions: Mr. Herb DeGroot, U.S. Weather Bureau, Macon Municipal Airport, reported the following weather conditions for period 0230 through 0330 hours (Eastern Standard Time) 6 Sep 64, in the Macon Ga area:

Mr. DeGroot opined that it is not likely any of the balloons released from the three locations described would have drifted to Macon Ga, area, since winds would not have carried them in this direction.

2a. Description of two objects observed a few moments after the first object:

(2) Size compared to a known object: About size of a ball point pen point.

(3) Color: Color was like a star, one object was bright and the other one was dim.

b. Description of Course of Object(s):

(1) What first called the attention of observer(s) to the object(s)? Attention was first drawn to the area of these two objects by action of first object sighted. Attention attracted to the two objects because they were moving.

(2) Angle or elevation and azimuth of object(s) when first observed: At about 45 degrees to 50 degrees above the horizon between the "Little Dipper" and the "Morning Star".

(3) Angle or elevation and azimuth of objects upon disappearance: Objects were still visible and active when witnesses went indoors at about 0945Z, 6 Sep 64; 2445 hours, Eastern Standard Time.

(4) Description of flight path and maneuvers of objects: Up and down and side to side for a distance of about 18 inches in a pattern like the letter

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"W".

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(5) How did the objects disappear? Faded out in place at daybreak.

3. Aircrafts in the area during time of sightings: Mr. Fahr, Base Operations (WRSDO) (WRBFD), Robins AFB Ga, reported that at 0806Z hours, 6 Sep 64, a Capital Airline Argosy Aircraft departed in a Northwest direction from Runway Nr. 32, Robins AFB Ga, enroute to Mobile Ala. There was no other aircraft reported in or around the Macon Ga area.

4. Any other activity or condition which might account for the sightings: Mr. James E. Macon, Civilian Policeman, Security and Law Enforcement Division, Robins AFB Ga, reported that while on duty as a policeman at Post Nr. 13, near the west boundary of Robins AFB Ga, at about 0830Z hours (0330 hours Eastern Standard Time), 6 Sep 64, he observed what appeared to be a Shooting Star move from north to southeast for a distance of approximately 36 inches and then burn out in approximately the same area as where unidentified flying objects were allegedly observed.

5. No physical evidence was obtained during these sightings.

6. Position title and comments of the preparing officer, including his preliminary analysis of the possible cause of the sighting(s): Lt Lonnie Z. Wetherington, GS-8, Civilian Policeman, Acting Shift Captain, Security and Law Enforcement Division, Robins AFB Ga. Based on information reported by Policeman Mason, the first object sighted by witnesses may have been the shooting star which burned out in

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approximately the same location where this object was observed. After this initial sighting, the power of suggestion, excitement, fatigue, and imagination combined probably accounted for the two star-like objects observed.
