



Did the Air Force ever come up with an explanation of the sighting - at last report, the Government was still puzzled?

I'm writing in request of all available information regarding the reports and sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (referred to by the Press as Flying Saucers) over the Binghamton-Endicott, N.Y. area during July, August, and September, 1964. I've heard accounts of the Air Force sending over 100 men into the above mentioned area to investigate the sightings. If you do not have any details at your disposal, kindly inform me of the name & address of the chief investigator, and the name(s) of the Air Force Base(s) from which the other investigators were dispatched. I've done intensive investigation myself on these sightings and I would now appreciate hearing the official U.S.A.F. findings. The Air Force has certainly had enough time for investigation and the issuance of a primary report of these sightings to the public. PLEASE: EVERYTIME I write the Air Force regarding UFO's, I get a run-around. All the Air Force sends me is a Project Blue Book pamphlet regarding sightings through Feb. 1964. I demand the raw facts on these sightings — not the usual run-around. Dr. Donald H. Menzel, Director of Astronomy at

1. Reference the attached letter from [REDACTED], requesting information on unidentified flying objects. Previous correspondence has been received from Mr [REDACTED] in May and June of 1964. The following is a suggested reply to him:

Dear Mr [REDACTED],

Your statement that the Air Force sent 100 men to investigate the Binghamton - Endicott UFO sightings is incorrect. The Air Force sent two, repeat two officers from Griffiss AFB, New York to investigate and talk to the witnesses and observers. There was nothing unusual about the sightings and all of the reports were determined to have been caused by natural phenomena.

A resume of the sightings is as follows: An aircraft flying from South to North with red, white and green lights; and aircraft on the Southwestern horizon with red and green lights; an aircraft flying from South to Northwest; Echo II; a jet bomber with red and green lights; flying Northeast to Southwest, Echo II again; two jets flying from West to East with red and green lights; a bright meteor streaking through the sky from South to Northeast; another meteor Southeast to North; an aircraft circling in the Northern Horizon; a jet flying Northeast to Southwest with red, yellow and green lights; another meteor, and then Echo I. As you can see, there is absolutely nothing unusual about these sightings. You too, can see all of these natural phenomena. With a pair of binoculars you could start scanning the sky after dark. High flying jets are difficult to identify without the aid of binoculars.



During the fall of 1947, the United States Government established "Project Saucer", under the authority of the Air Force, to investigate the sudden rash of flying saucer reports. About two years later, Project Saucer was disbanded and another project under another code name was established, namely "Project Bluebook", which is still in operation.

During Project Saucer's two years of operation it investigated some four hundred UFO reports, each one being named numerically. For each case, an account and summary of the findings was published and made available to the public.

I realize our government is a very efficient organization, and therefore am led to believe that it still has records of such summaries. I am interested in obtaining the files and summaries of cases number 33, 144, & 172. If possible, to save both the Air Force and myself unnecessary correspondence, please send any other back summaries available. I would also appreciate a copy of the Air Force press release of December 27, 1949 and a copy of the Project Saucer report of April 27, 1949.

Dear Major Jacks:

As you undoubtedly know, last evening, the 2nd of March, a spacecraft of unknown origin landed in a field in Brooksville, Florida. The landing was witnessed by a Mr. [REDACTED], a wealthy, local resident.

The spacecraft was approximately thirty feet in diameter, six to seven feet in thickness, and stood four feet above the ground on four (4) vertical supports or legs. When the object landed, a "creature" came forth from the object. The creature was described as approximately five feet in height and wearing a glass-like helmet. The creature brought forth an object similar to a camera and took two photographs or readings of Mr. [REDACTED]. The creature then returned to it's ship, and, when doing so, dropped a cloth or paper-like material. After the craft departed, Mr. [REDACTED] picked up the material and reported the sighting to the authorities. Investigators from MacDill Air Force base, Tampa, were sent to interview Mr. [REDACTED].

The legs of the craft left four impressions in the ground. An on-the-spot analysis of the cloth showed it to be made of an unknown material. The writing on the cloth has not yet been

recognized as an earthly language.

Since this sighting has aroused much speculation in the Tampa Bay area, and numerous residents have asked me for information, I have decided to make an intensive study of this particular case. Therefore, kindly send me all available information, including any press releases or dispatches, report of weather conditions over Brooksville, confirmation of possible radar contact at Tampa International Airport, and photograph and analysis of evidence (cloth-like material).

I realize much of this information won't be available for sometime, but please make every attempt to answer as soon as possible.


