Unknown was compared to that of a skyrocket. It was as bright as a auto headlight at a few feet in distance. The object did not give off smoke, sparks, or vapor, nor did it appear to stand still. Dr. Charles Olivier was consulted for his comments and he said that all indications are such that a bright meteor or fireball was observed. He said that there is no question to its identity.

Report of sighting on July 7, 1966, at 2:32 AM (CDT).
Sighted by, Mrs. [redacted] of [redacted] S.W., Cedar
Rapids, Iowa 52404. Telephone [redacted].

Mrs. [redacted] gave the following information to me:
Mrs. [redacted] and her husband had been sitting in the front yard because of the heat. A brisk breeze came up, so they went in the house. She was standing at the front door, ready to shut it, when she observed a bright green fireball come "downward from the sky in an arch toward the ground". See diagram. It disappeared "behind neighbors house". She said it looked like "a 4th of July skyrocket, if they made them green in color", and "it looked like it fell in neighbor's back yard. I told her to look for anything odd when they mowed next time, but they found nothing". She said it was larger than a grapefruit at arm's length, but smaller than a basketball at arm's length. She estimated that it was "about 400 feet" away. She did not recall if there had been aircraft in the area prior to, during, or immediately after the sighting. She was looking East when she made the sighting (through a screen door). The observance lasted for a "few seconds". It was compared to the brightness of an auto headlight several yards away. There was no sound and the object appeared solid. The object did not give off smoke, sparks, or vapor. Nor did it appear to stand still, suddenly speed up, explode, flicker, throb, pulsate, change shape, or brightness. The moon was hazy, scattered clouds were present. She did not make a report to police or newspaper officials, but called a woman who also made the sighting (copy of news story included). She spun her "husband around by the arm, but it was gone before he could focus on it."

It was also observed by Mrs. [redacted] S.W.
(E.M. [redacted]) Mr. [redacted] is the head of Carroll Realty Co. The news account appeared as follows (on the 8th):

WOMAN REPORTS SEEING A UFO IN C.R. SKIES — Mrs. [redacted] 11 [redacted] Twenty-first avenue SW, didn't put much stock in Unidentified Flying Objects (UFO) stories. Not until 2:32 a.m. Monday, that is. At that time, Mrs. Carroll's sleep was disrupted by a noise. Looking outside, she discovered that the wind was rustling bushes adjacent to the house. Looking skyward, however, Mrs. Carroll was amazed. She told the Gazette Monday that she saw a brilliantly colored object appear to the right of the moon and angling toward the ground. "The colors were magnificent. It was just beautiful," she related. At first glance, Mrs. [redacted] impression of the object was that it was a helicopter. It was visible only "a couple of seconds", however, before it "just disappeared." "I never saw anything like it before," Mrs. [redacted] said. She said she plans to set her alarm clock for 2:15 a.m. Tuesday and study the skyline over the Wilson & Co. packing plant and the area formerly described as Stumptown for another glimpse of the UFO.
