SIGHT IN ABOUT 30 SECONDS. IT WAS A METALLIC COLORED OBJECT. AFTER ANALYZING SGT FERGUSON'S SIGHTING A DEFINATE CONCLUSIVE FINDING CAN NOT BE DETERMINED. A POSSIBLE REASON FOR THE OBSERVATION IS SOME PRANKSTERS USING AN AIRCRAFT LANDING LIGHT ON A PICKUP VEHICLE WITH A FILTER ATTACHED THATWOULD DECREASE THE INTENSITY OF THE LIGHT. THIS COULD ACCOUNT FOR THE LIGHT BEING ABLE TO FOLLOW SGT [REDACTED] AND FAMILY AS THEY PROCEEDED NORTHWARD ON THE HIGHWAY.



I am writing you about something our children saw the nite of March 29, 1965. I, myself, didn't see it because it took me too long to run out of the house. But, I do believe my children saw something and are telling the truth. It happened about 7:45, as we were finishing up dinner.

We had had company for supper & at first I didn't believe the kids and when they came running in again very excited, I went out. By that time the kids said it was just a speck in the sky and I didn't cope out soon enough. They must have observed it for 3 minutes or longer and I wish I had noticed the first time they came in. Maybe I should have written you sooner, but I was very undecided as how to go about it. The kids said it

it so well. They described it this way.



There was no noise or sound. At first it went very slow, like a slow cloud. Later it went straight up extremely fast, zig-zagged to the north-west and disappeared. They lined it up with trees in our woods.
